## Conference Programme Chair

**Dr Sebastian Gaigg** - has been a long-standing member of the Autism Research Group at City, University of London, where his research pursues two principal issues. One strand of his work focuses on understanding learning and memory processes across the autism spectrum, ranging from the examination of episodic memory in autistic adults who live relatively independent lives, to studies of learning processes in minimally verbal autistic children and individuals with complex needs. His second strand of work seeks to develop a better understanding of the emotional lives of autistic individuals, particularly concerning the mechanisms underlying the unusually high prevalence of anxiety disorders in this population, and their implications for the development of effective treatments.

## Keynote speakers



Professor Francesca Happe is Professor of Cognitive Neuroscience and Director of the Social, Genetic & Developmental Psychiatry Centre at the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology & Neuroscience, King's College London. Her research focuses on autism spectrum conditions. She has explored the nature of social understanding

in neurotypical development and 'mentalising' difficulties in autism. She is also actively engaged in studies of abilities and assets in autism, and their relation to detail-focused cognitive style. Some of her recent work focuses on mental health on the autism spectrum, and under-researched subgroups including women and the elderly. Her research spans cognitive experiments, functional neuroimaging, exploration of acquired brain lesions, and behaviour genetic methods. She was recently ranked in the top 10 most productive and highly cited authors in autism research worldwide (Sweileh, et al., 2016). She is a Fellow of the British Academy and the Academy of Medical Sciences, past-President of the International Society for Autism Research (INSAR; 2013-2015), and has received the British Psychological Society Spearman Medal, the Experimental Psychology Society Prize and the Royal Society Rosalind Franklin Award.

Francesca's talk is titled: Autism research: looking back to look forward?.



**Dr Damian Milton** works for the Tizard Centre, University of Kent as a part-time Lecturer in Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. He also works part-time for the National Autistic Society (NAS) as an Autism Knowledge and Expertise Consultant. Damian also teaches on the MA Education (Autism) programme at

London South Bank University and has been a consultant for the Transform Autism Education (TAE) project and a number of projects for the Autism Education Trust (AET), and is project lead for the National Autistic Taskforce (NAT). Damian's interest in autism began when his son was diagnosed in 2005 as autistic at the age of two. Damian was also diagnosed with Asperger's in 2009 at the age of thirty-six. Damian's primary focus is on increasing the meaningful participation of autistic people and people with learning disabilities in the research process, and chairs the Participatory Autism Research Collective (PARC): www.PARCautism.co.uk

Professor Tony Charman is the Chair of Clinical Child Psychology at the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology & Neuroscience, King's College London and also works as a Clinical Psychologist in a specialist service for children with autism and complex neurodevelopmental conditions at the South London and Maudsley NHS

Foundation Trust. His main research interest is the investigation of social cognitive development in children with autism and the clinical application of this work via screening, diagnostic, epidemiological, intervention, and 'at risk' studies. He has published more than 250 peer-reviewed papers and over 30 book chapters. He has served on a number of expert panels for the MRC and NICE in the UK, NIH in the USA and the WHO. **Tony's talk is titled:** *Personalising treatments: trials, tribulations, mechanisms and outcomes.* 



Sue Fletcher-Watson is a Senior Research Fellow at the Patrick Wild Centre, University of Edinburgh. She is a developmental psychologist, studying how children grow and learn, with a particular focus on non-normative experiences, such as autism and preterm birth. Her work aims to apply rigorous methods from psychology to

questions with clinical, educational and societal impact. Current research themes include: investigations of how digital interactive technologies can best be deployed to support learning and personal growth for autistic children; describing the impact of bilingualism on cognitive development and life experiences in autistic people; and innovative empirical tests of the 'double empathy problem' in the context of interaction between neurodivergent and neurotypical adults. She strives to achieve meaningful partnerships with community representatives and to support neurodivergent leadership in research. She is a recipient of the British Psychological Society Margaret Donaldson Award and a Certificate of Excellence from Autism Rights Group Highland.
